



The War of the Trojans Class 5/6 Play

















Class 7/8

Aloha e 7th/8th Grade Families,

We have wrapped up our final history block of the year, bringing us all the way from the American Revolution to modern day through the biographies of Benjamin Franklin, Harriet Tubman, Helen Keller, and Malala Yousafzai. At the same time, the students have continued to read their book, *Chains*, a historical fiction novel set during the American Revolution but through the eyes of an enslaved black girl who is torn with where to set her allegiances when her freedom is less than guaranteed by either Patriots or Loyalists. In all of these cases, biographies help the students to see how goodness shines throughout history no matter the darkness that may rise up around it.

We have also been blessed with a series of classes on Friday with Etta Mae on the traditional egg-dying art of Pysanky. There have been some remarkable parallels between our history lessons and this incredible art that was suppressed and kept alive in secrecy during the reign of the Soviet Union in Ukraine. Last week when the class began drawing their designs on the eggs with wax there was a magical mood as everyone quietly worked on laying their symbols onto their eggs.

For the next two weeks, the class will be fully focused on rehearsing for our play, *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, during Main Lesson. Please continue to support your student in practicing their lines so that we can use our rehearsal time for acting. Our performance will be **Thursday March 13th**. **Dinner will be at 5pm and the play will begin at 6pm.**

Please save the dates for our Parent-Teacher Conference days: March 25, 27, 28.

I will send out a sign-up shortly.

These dates come right after Spring Break, so please plan accordingly so that you are available during at least one of these days if you plan to travel. It is extremely difficult for me to schedule conferences outside of the normal slots, so please be available and sign up.

Mahalo nui, Mr. Dewey Aloha from the 5th and 6th Grade.

The Vernal equinox is approaching and the days are beginning to lengthen. We have been noticing the emergence of new growth on the plants and flowers. The chickens in our coop have begun laying eggs again. All a sure sign that spring is on its way.

Over the last few weeks we have been studying aspects of geology and the components that make up our world. We observed a simple but exciting experiment demonstrating the intrusive and extrusive qualities of igneous rock. In the upcoming weeks we will be observing crystal, sedimentary and metamorphic rock formation. Part of that will be to visit the dinosaur exhibit at Imiloa.

Our study was paused for a week or so in order for us to practice our play. The students are incredibly proud of their performance. I too am thrilled at the level of fun and creativity they showed and proud of their performance. The students did much of the work on their costumes, added many suggestions to the staging, and even wrote some of the dialogue. Thanks to all the families that came out to see our production. We would also like to thank Val Webb and the many parent volunteers for organizing and preparing the yummy meal before the play.

We are continuing to develop our skills in the 5 Pentathlon games. It is exciting to see the students performing their long jumps and discus throwing well. The relay race, Greek wrestling and javelin throwing are the other three we are practicing.

This month is a little short as we have spring break for a week and then a week of parent teacher conferences after that. When we return after break we will begin exploring the history of the Roman Empire, begin preparing for our May Day festival and continuing practicing our Pentathlon skills.








Class 2

Pedagogical Stories



The first was inspired by the setting of the school campus cleanup ithe the last weekend and tree care. Trees will often drop a limb in order to continue their growth. The next story I chose to include to address healing changes was the biography of a figure from our current block of study. That of George Washington Carver, there is much to say about the deeds of this unique and talented individual. The point I chose to emphasize in this regard was how he met the issue of the depletion of nutrients in the soil with new plants that revitalize and replenished the quality of the soil. He was an example of someone who was dedicated to their field, worked towards what they believed in, acknowledged the results of much trial and error and also someone who listened to their own intuition.

The bakery

The concept of division is first introduced in Grade One and equations are presented horizontally. We are now seeing the division in the other common format, what we will call the division house or the "bakery". Villagers come from town, knock on the door and receive what the baker has on hand. Regardless of how much each customer is asking for, the baker only feels good about giving everybody an equal amount. Thus the quality of division remains, which is sharing evenly.




The GOLDEN RULES of GNOMES:
