The Daily Dance: Drop-Off, Pick-Up & Beyond

A new school year means fresh chances to practice our *traffic flow choreography*! Think of drop-off and pick-up as a little daily dance—we all move more gracefully when everyone knows the steps. Mahalo for helping keep our mornings and afternoons safe, smooth, and neighbor-friendly.

Please drive slowly on campus at all times. Speeding, quick starts, or "burning out" creates a real safety concern for our keiki and families. Also remember to turn off your engine while waiting, and to respect our neighbors by not lining up on Maku'u or driving down 26th past the Hui Lilikoi gate. The paved circle driveway is for grades' active pick-up and drop-off only—after 8:00 a.m. it may not be used, and cars should never be left unattended. If you'd like to park and walk your child in, please use the gravel lot off 26th Avenue. Late pickups will be charged at \$1 per minute.

If your child arrives after 8:00 a.m., please stop by the office first to pick up a tardy pass, then walk them to Morning Protocol (if still happening) or to their classroom until the teacher welcomes them in. Students not ready to enter class by 8:00 will be marked tardy, and arrivals after 10:00 a.m. will be counted as absent for the day.

When coming to campus during the school day, please check in at the office before delivering items or visiting a classroom. All adults must have office consent to enter classrooms, and as always, Mālamalama Waldorf is a cell phone-free campus during school hours.



Aloha e 8th Grade Families!

What a great beginning to our final school year together! Mahalo for coming to the back to school gathering with the 1st Grade. It was wonderful to see the 1st Graders begin to develop bonds with the 8th Grade, making it easier for Ms. Hooser and I to see who would make a great buddy pair. The 8th Graders beautifully walked their buddies across the bridge, and in a blink of an eye it will be the 8th Graders being walked over at the end of the year.

The students have been very diligent about writing in their planners and returning it with it signed. We have only had one slip-up! Bravo! Thank you to all of you parents for supporting this organization and accountability.

The students have been very engaged with our first block of the year: Gastronomy. We have spent an entire week studying sugar, its history, how it spread, its encouragement of slavery, the Haitian revolution against colonization and slavery, the development of sugar from beets, and the life and death of the sugar industry in Hawaii. Thank you to Alex and Sylvi for driving on Monday! It was great to get the students out and see real artifacts that tell some of the stories of Hawaii. Yesterday they began their first essay of the year where they could choose to write about any two topics related to sugar. They all came in today with excellent work that they were proud of.

Now we are pivoting more towards chemistry. Yesterday we harvested and juiced sugarcane. Today we will boil it down into a solid form, and tomorrow we will do some experiments to further reveal sugar's properties and how to test for simple sugars. Next, we will turn our focus towards grains, beginning with rice!

The students also seem engaged with all of their specialty classes. They began yarn painting with Auntie Kati in Handwork class and working on a rhythm song, a Portuguese song, and a multi-instrument song with her in Music class as well. In Japanese they are refreshing their use of the alphabets and how to pronounce different place names in the world with Yuki Sensei. In Movement class Mr. Ragland has been bringing exercises that bring them levity and teamwork with Space Ball and volleyball.

In our first math class we visually explored numbers, discovering patterns through shape and number. This led the class into reviewing divisibility rules. They were then given a new game to play at home as part of their homework.

Finally, we started our first book of the year, The Outsiders. The students already seem hooked, amazed that they actually got assigned a book that contains smoking and gang fighting!

There is an incredible harmony in this group, and they seem to be enjoying the small class and tight bonds that they are forming more and more each day.

Please continue to make progress on the 8th Grade projects!

We have had a nice time settling in and becoming acquainted with our two new additions to our class. Nyla and Dominic are welcome additions and fitting in nicely with the class.


As we approach September, we will begin working on our songs and poems of the season and preparing for Michaelmas and the celebration of autumn at the end of the month.

Wishing you an exciting and engaging school year.



This sunflower poem is recited each day by the students during part of our morning movement exercises as they toss their bean bags in various formations. The students remind me of golden sunflowers, with their shining faces and bright smiles as they happily greet each day! It has been a joyous beginning to the year. It's so wonderful being together again. We are glad to be reunited with friends from last year and to meet new friends as well. We are pleased to welcome Coral, Karuna, Lauren, Ayden and their families and to welcome back Mina, gone since first grade, and her family. The students are settling back into the school routines with ease and they are sweetly helping their new friends feel at home. I am so proud of their generous, joyful spirits.

We are beginning the year with a language arts block with tales from the Kalevala as the story material. This epic Finnish poem is rich with imaginative images and magical characters and provides the students with many wonderful ideas to write about. Composition writing is a focus of this block. The students are learning to organize their thoughts and their writing as they retell bits of the story. We are busily practicing punctuation skills, proofreading, editing and paragraph formation. A review of parts of speech is supporting them to learn how to enrich and enliven their writing.

Our specialty subjects are expanded this year. We are pleased to welcome back Yukiko Sensei for Japanese class and to welcome Aunty Kati for both music and handwork, Kumu Angela for Hawaiian studies and Mr. Ragland for movement education/games. I am continuing to offer gardening, painting, form drawing, language arts and math track classes. We also have reading groups twice weekly.

We will be having a class meeting on Friday, September 5. We will begin with a potluck lunch at 12:45. I am looking forward to sharing some fun activities and an overview of the curriculum planned for this year. It will also be nice to have a chance to have some time to get to know one another. I hope you will be able to come! I look forward to hearing from all of you and encourage you to email, call, or set up a time to meet with me to share any questions, concerns or thoughts you'd like to share if you are unable to attend the meeting, or have something personal to share.

Our Class 2/3 students are joyfully settling into the new school year. In main lesson, we are working in our first Language Arts block. The children have been hearing stories of fables and of St. George, St. Jerome, and St. Francis, writing and drawing about their courage, compassion, and wisdom. These tales of bravery and kindness prepare our hearts for Michaelmas, where our class is busy preparing to share a short class play.

In the garden, we have begun working with the Hawaiian Moon calendar to guide our planting and tending. The children are learning to observe and honor the rhythms of nature, especially our moon. One afternoon while weeding, we discovered a *giant caterpillar*, which sparked much wonder and excitement!

As we find our rhythm together, I am filled with gratitude—for the unique beauty of each student, for the wonders of nature that we discover every day, and especially for the support of our parents and families. Thank you for adjusting home rhythms, for providing supplies, and for all the unseen ways you help the children meet each day ready for school. I am also deeply thankful for our larger community, whose continual offerings of time, energy, and care nurture and grow our school into the vision we hold together.

I look forward to the year ahead and the many new beginnings that await us.

Aloha to our First Grade Village and our greater Malamalama Community,

Our Grade One Family has already benefited greatly by the abundance of Love, Wonder, and Magic that happens when something is new and precious. We are Happy-Tired at the end of each day, having worked hard to ground into our growing bodies, and to form our habit-bodies into the shape of school rhythms and structure.

We are just finishing our first Main Lesson Block, Form Drawing, and each student has already produced such beautiful work that we are inclined to get up and do little Art Walks several times a day. We will certainly be sharing some of this delight at our next parent meeting, Monday, September 8th, 4:30-6:30 PM. One of our students said, "I don't know WHY Ms. Hooser Loves straight and curved lines SO MUCH!" 😊 💞 My true answer is because making them is beautiful and we will be using them a lot, all year. For the adult reader, however, I will share a little behind-the-matter magic written by a seasoned Waldorf Teacher, Donna Simmons: "Form drawing is like water, it is like the movement of plants as they grow, it is like the forms snowflakes make and are made of ... Form drawing is about a moment of movement caught on a page. It is about concentration, perseverance, control of the will, grace, and purposefulness. Form drawing is a therapeutic art. It calls up the inner discipline the child needs to work beautifully and skillfully within the confines of a page. It helps a child learn about boundaries ... one needs to be aware of one's surroundings, think ahead where one is going with a form, control what one's crayon is doing, and relax into the movement of the form. It is a profoundly healing art." So this is some of the depth of what we have been enjoying, and why.

Well, that is just Main Lesson! We are also having So Much Fun with our soul-nourishing subject classes: Learning how to say our favorite colors in Japanese, making knitting needles in Handwork class, making lovely music together, finding good rest, painting, forming with beeswax, and discovering our favorite games in Movement class. So Good. And So Much to look forward to. In September, we expect to meet our new Hawai'iana teacher, as well as some magical symbols that will come to us full of sound and meaning and lots of new adventures.

Cheek cheek cherry
