From The Garden

Aloha from the garden,

Here the garden is growing. The weeds are growing too. I'm pleased to announce we have a wonderful grant that we need to put to use over the summer. For those that didn't know, we received \$45,000 this year for improving our garden and gardening program. Some of this money is to build a shed and outdoor classroom space, as well as a shaded growing space for a plant nursery. A food tree nursery will begin growing food trees for our community, as well as for our grounds. A long-term goal is to have a Food Forest on our campus. So over the next year to year and a half, we will be developing that program.

Over the summer, that means that we will be expanding our garden area to include a classroom and new storage shed. We will also build a shade structure, install a catchment, and some irrigation. We are in need of someone that has some heavy machinery to do some earth clearing for us. We're going to extend the garden about 30 ft beyond where it currently is to include the buildings and the new shed. If you have earthmoving equipment or know of people who do, please contact me so we can make a plan. We, of course, would love to have the work donated if possible.

Depending on the timing over the summer, we will also be spending about 2 weeks building the building. It will be a simple structure, and we are going to harvest some of the 'ōhi'a poles from some of the recently killed 'ōhi'as in our forest.

If you are interested at all in helping to design, clear, build, or otherwise help out over the summer, please let me know. Some of the older students—5th through 8th grade (hint hint)—are welcome to come and join too. Please let me know if you are interested in helping. I will be on campus regularly throughout the summer.

Class News Class 7/8

June 2025

Aloha e 7th/8th Grade Families,

This is it! The final countdown to all of the grand festivities! The class trip was a giant success full of adventure, challenge, and wonder. Thank you all for all of your fundraising and planning efforts. Mahalo nui loa.

We began our trip in the city of Seattle, staying at the Seattle Waldorf School. They were gracious hosts and a great homebase for our urban rompings. The class spent all of Saturday walking through downtown from Pike Place Market, to Chihuly Glass Museum, to the Space Needle, to the Museum of Pop Culture (MOPOP). Along the way the class introduced themselves with "Oli Malamalama" and presented lei. It was always remarkable to see how people reacted to our chanting and lei giving. The young woman at Chihuly exclaimed, "This made my day, my week! Actually, this is my first day on the job!" Hopefully we provided an auspicious beginning. The museum guide at MOPOP was truly touched, sharing with us that his father actually grew up in Hilo, and he fondly remembers going to Ken's House of Pancakes with his dad.

On Sunday we went to the Suquamish Museum, learning about some Coast Salish history, noticing some parallels with Hawaiian history, and taking in the breathtaking handiwork and ingenuity of the tribe. The museum had a copy of Chief Seattle's famous speech that I then read to the class. It was long, but it was interesting to observe the students go from restless to absorbed as these powerful words sank in. Afterwards, we walked to Chief Seattle's grave site where we recited "Oli Mahalo" and laid a lei at his grave. A truly chicken skin moment.

For the next three night we camped at Fort Townsend State Park. It was wet, cold, and beautiful. I am so thankful to our chaperones, Kalia, Porter, and Mark, who helped me save the students from their subtropical habits, forcing them into their fleeces, rain jackets, and warm hats. Each evening we had a warm fire and games of tag in the forest.

While camping, we had two different days of adventure. Our first day was to Port Townsend's Northwest Maritime Center. The class learned how to operate 18th century longboats, taking them out of the marina into the Puget Sound. They also did some marine science, measuring the pH of the sound, its salinity, and taking a sample of water to investigate under microscopes. Back in the lab they discovered a multitude of plankton wiggling around, including noctilucas, which are bioluminescent. Would we see any at night? Stay tuned! Finally, we also had a lesson in different wayfinding techniques throughout the world, which included...Polynesian wayfinding and the star compass!

Our other day of adventure was spent in search of the great white crystal: snow! We drove to Hurricane Ridge in the Olympic National park and were fortunate to find the meadow at the top well dusted with fresh powder. The students dove right in, hurling snowballs, making snow angels, and attempting a snowman whose torso was too heavy to lift, so it became an icy throne. To warm up after our frozen frolickings we descended upon Sol Duc Hot Springs, soaking and splashing in warm and cool waters alike.

Finally, we reached our culminating adventure. We said goodbye to Fort Townsend, took the ferry to Whidbey Island, and drove north to the Port of Bellingham to meet our final host: the Zodiac Schooner. We were divided into sail stations and over the next three days learned how to raise and lower sails and tack as a team. We were also treated to warm bunks and divine cooking from the ship's chef. In the morning we were accompanied by pairs of harbor seals and at night we found those special stars in the sea: bioluminescence! While sailing we also spotted orcas and porpoises all beneath benevolently sunny skies.

It was a tremendous adventure and we were all filled with gratitude for the experience.



Dear Class Three/Four,

What a magical month of May it was! There were so many special moments. The month began with lei making, the May Day Festival, dancing the May Pole dance, the Spring Fair, and the trash fashion show.

Soon after was our class play. What wonderful performances the class shared with everyone. They took great pride in seeing the students of the school, as well as their families, enjoy the play. It warmed my heart to see them working together so well and having so much fun. Mahalo to all the parents that helped support the play in so many ways.

Since the play, we have been enjoying the last block for the year. We have been studying Hawaiian canoe plants. During our farming block earlier in the year, we looked at Hawaiian staple foods, so during this block we are looking at the plants they brought and cultivated for different uses, as well as food. We are looking at plants brought for weaving, storage, cordage, dye, medicine, and wood—for example: the Hala, Ipu, Kukui, Hau, Olona, Noni, 'Ōhi'a'ai, 'Awa, Kamani, and Niu.

We planted a hala tree that was given to me by a student from a previous class at one inch tall. After being in a container for a few years, the hala is now around six feet tall and very happy to be in the ground. We also planted a Kukui, Noni, and 'Ōhi'a'ai trees on campus. It has been a wonderful block to wrap up the school year.

We will celebrate summer birthdays June 2, 3, and 4. I will let you know which day your child will be celebrated. The last day on campus is Thursday, June 5. The Rose Ceremony will be in the morning. The first-grade students will give each eighth-grade student a rose. Each of the classes will gift the grade eight with a song. All parents are warmly welcome to attend.

After that, we will pack up all of our work and look at it together. Please make sure to send your child with a box or large bag to bring all of their amazing work home in. After packing up, we will have a potluck class party. Please send something to share for a potluck lunch. Parents are welcome to attend the potluck too.

Friday is the all-school beach day, and I hope to see you all there! It has been such a wonderful school year! Mahalo nui to everyone that was able to help it be so special—the reading group volunteers, field trip chaperones, laundry washers, drama support, filming, and general help.




