We Have Exciting News About Recent Grants!

We're thrilled to announce that Malamalama Waldorf School has been awarded two significant grants this November:

- Early Childhood Wage Compensation and
 Stabilization Assistance Program: \$15,000 to
 support Kinderhale staff salaries.
- Hawaifi Community Foundation (HCF) Puna
 Strong Grant: \$30,000 to establish a community plant nursery. This includes building a greenhouse/shade house and integrating plant-growing activities into our curriculum.

The second grant is especially exciting as it will allow students and faculty to incorporate these activities into their learning and teaching while also serving as a resource for the community. This initiative has the potential to become a valuable funding source for the school as well! Planning for this project is underway, and we can't wait to bring it to life.

Grade 7/8

Aloha e 7th/8th Grade Families,

This time of year is a special one as we usher in the season of Makahiki and many religions of the world celebrate the renewal of light with the coming solstice.

In our classroom, we will open each morning with lighting a candle to mark our approaching the solstice and Christmas, honoring the kingdoms of nature that support us as human beings along the way:


The first light of advent is the light of the stones,
Stones that live in seashells and crystals and in bones.
The second light of advents is the light of plants,
Plants that reach up to the sun and in the breezes dance.
The third light of advent is the light of the beasts,
The light of hope that we may see in greatest and in least.
The fourth light of advent is the light of man,
The light of love, the light of thought to give and understand.

This block we are studying the Platonic Solids and other three-dimensional shapes. The students are getting a well-rounded experience of these shapes and concepts through clay modeling, geometric drawing, and (soon enough) paper folding. Alongside these artistic experiences, the students are also learning how to calculate volume and surface area.

Students should be reading their chosen biographies. Make sure they are reading each night! These should be completed by December 13th. Additionally, each night students should be studying their scripts. It's a long play, so they need to start memorizing on their own time now.

There are many festivities this month! I look forward to seeing you all during these beautiful community events.

First Grade

Warm December Greetings!

Continuing into December, the 1st grade class is embarking on a journey into the realm of the four mathematical processes, guided by our four gnome friends who have arrived in the Land of Numerica to assist King Crosspatch.

Piper Plus and Melody Minus were the perfect pair, One loved to gather and one loved to share.

Timmy Times made things multiply. All the people stared.

David Divide shared evenly and made everything fair.

So far in our block we have worked out some differences in the kingdom through some math games and working together to make a 100-bead number string. We will continue this math block through the end of the year.

This month, our class will learn about the advent through changes to our nature table and a morning walk at the beginning of the week. Beginning with Monday, December 2 we will observe the Kingdom of Stones—rocks, soil, clouds in the sky, shells, and raindrops. On the second Monday we will observe the Kingdom of Plants in the landscape—greens, flowers, and leaves. On the third Monday, we will observe the comings and goings of the Kingdom of Beasts—chickens and pigs are busy foraging. What else can we see or see signs of?

When we come back in January, students will dive into learning their vowels. Many have already shown curiosity, asking how we combine these letters to form words. I've mentioned that there's a secret ingredient involved. We will use these five essential ingredients (A, E, I, O, U) to jump straight into our spelling activities during the Language Arts block in the new year.

December 11: Our class will host a festive celebration after lunch at 1:00 PM. We will kick off the event by sharing some songs we've been practicing, followed by refreshments, a fun game, and a secret Santa gift exchange.
